

### Creating a Photographic Project Involving Motion - November 2025

# Assignment to be shown at January 22, 2026 meeting By Jeffrey Sward

Starting a project by first determining project scope will assist with defining the objective of each photograph. Objectives might include: fine art, personal expression, nature, or photojournalism.

Determine the type(s) of motion which your project will utilize. Types of motion include: suspended motion (freezing action), motion blur, intentional camera movement, long exposures, zoom blur, combining existing light and flash, panning, and studio.

Expect unpredictable results as part of the process. Technical challenges generally have solutions. Google is your friend. For example: to fix too much blur shorten the shutter speed; to fix too little blur lengthen the shutter speed.



Split image showing slow shutter speed blur (upper left) and fast shutter speed sharp (lower right)

For lighting issues expect to experiment in different lighting conditions to find what works best. When more blur is needed, using neutral density (ND) filters will lengthen shutter speeds.



Long exposure combined with second curtain electronic flash synchronization.

Examples of shutter speed usage: A shutter speed of 1/125 sec should freeze people walking around; A shutter speed of 1/500 sec works well for bicycles; shutter speeds near 1/2000 sec work well for cars and motorcycles; relatively long exposures of multiple seconds will blur a waterfall or blur people when they are walking around, effectively removing them from the image. If the shutter speed goes over 30 seconds then use manual mode and the bulb setting.

When completely in doubt about selecting a shutter speed start with 1/30 sec and experiment from there. Or utilize the Ted Orland rule: "1/60 at f/8 is the correct exposure for all photographs."

Common camera setting options include:

- Shutter priority: the photographer sets the shutter speed, while the camera automatically adjusts the aperture
- Aperture priority: the photographer sets the aperture, while the camera automatically adjusts the shutter speed.
- Auto ISO mode: the photographer sets both shutter speed and aperture while the camera automatically selects an ISO speed
- Manual mode: the photographer sets the shutter speed, aperture, and ISO speed.

# Assignment: Motion

### Carpool:

Meet at 9:00 a.m. at the south end of the AAA parking lot located on the northeast corner of Beach Boulevard and Stark Drive, Huntington Beach. Drive time is approximately 60 minutes from Huntington Beach. Here is the link for public transit If you prefer. <a href="https://www.metro.net/">https://www.metro.net/</a> Carpooling is a good way to go and get to know other members.

### Parking:

Parking remains separate for the two places, so choose your lot based on where you'll be spending most of your time (and your dollars). The Farmer's Market offers up to two hours free parking with validation from select merchants. Meanwhile, The Grove provides one hour of parking for \$2, and, following that, charges in increments of 15 minutes. Lower rates are available with validation from select restaurants and retailers. Valet parking is also available at The Grove for those of whom money is not an issue. At both places, remembering to validate your parking ticket is key; without validation, parking will cost you a pretty penny (there is a \$30 daily maximum at either The Grove or Farmer's Market).



"Meet me on 3rd and Fairfax" were once common expressions among Angelenos - and with good reason. At the corner of the aforementioned street, you'll find both the Farmer's Market and <a href="The Grove">The Grove</a>, two must-see destinations that together form a community hub of sorts, offering an abundance of dining, shopping and entertainment options.





Though the <u>Farmer's Market</u> and The Grove are, in fact, two separate entities, they have a strong synergy due to their geographic proximity to one another. Their adjacent locations make it all too easy to navigate both sites within a single visit. On any given day, there is a constant stream of visitors strolling to and from the two attractions. An electric trolley is even on-site to shuttle the less mobile between The Grove and the Farmer's Market.

Despite their similarity in offering tourist-friendly food and retail options, the Farmer's Market and The Grove differ significantly in their history. Having opened in 2002, The Grove is much younger than the Farmer's Market, which has served as an L.A. landmark since it opened in 1934.





#### **Suggested PSOC Critique Guidelines**

PSOC was founded as a platform for image sharing and supportive self-improvement. With the expanded utilization of outside professional photographers to critique the members' submitted images, that mission has evolved into a shared desire to become more proficient in the art and craft of photography.

It is the responsibility of those who critique to foster that desire and encourage and *teach* the members through that critique. The critique should be a careful review of the images accompanied by an *opinion* regarding the overall strength of the image, as well as an *opinion* regarding the artistic and technical aspects of the image presented. Although the spectrum of photographers showing images includes beginners as well as some who are very advanced, learning and growth should be encouraged at all levels. The following guidelines have been formulated to bring a consistency of format to the critiques. These are not checklists, just suggestions to help the critiquers help our members improve their photographic craft.

- 1. What is your overall first impression? What impact does the image have for you? What do you like about the photograph? *Be concise*. Remember you are teaching *all* the members as well as the contributing photographer.
- 2. What *constructive* comments can you make? How does the composition and framing work? How does your eye take in the elements of the image? What gets your attention, and why? Note use of techniques like "rule" of thirds, leading lines, framing, patterns, lighting choices, and other visual elements. What helpful comments can you make?
- 3. How do you see the technical and processing factors contributing to the image? This may include perspective, exposure, highlight detail, shadow detail, bright and dark areas, contrast; processing of color or black and white, luminescence, contrast, vignetting, dodging, burning, and cropping.
- 4. Make it clear that your comments are all *your opinion* on how *you* might do it differently, based on your experience, personal style, vision, and processing preferences. Other artists/photographers may often see the image differently.
- 5. How might you encourage the photographer? Remember, the photographer has a reason to show this work and obviously feels good about it. You are encouraged to ask the photographer to comment on what they were seeing and expressing in the image. We would also like you to encourage the members in attendance to participate through questions and comments.
- 6. Although the title slide for each member's submittal does not need to be critiqued, an outstanding title image can be *quickly* noted.
- 7. *Please be concise in your comments*. The meetings are scheduled for two hours, and there can often be well over 100 images submitted.
